This qualitative study can serve as a foundation for future research because there appears to be little research that explores what practice approaches APS social workers use. As the elderly population increases and places greater demands on public aging services, it is essential to assess the adequacy of those services and the personnel who provide them. The purpose of this research was to reveal social workers' current approaches and perspective of using strength based practice during home visits or if SBP was utilized at the time. This study also looked at any barriers that the staff might have experienced in using SBP and recommendation to use SBP at their agency. The key theme that emerged was that the majority of the participants suggested the need for additional trainings and educational opportunities for workers, in addition to changing their data collection processes. It is important that researchers conduct follow-up research to examine

whether there is a shift towards using SBP. The changes include changing hiring practices and making sure social workers have an educational foundation in social work. The knowledge base can then be enhanced by job site trainings that keep the social worker connected to current and changing ideas and approaches.
