How They Fought Ray Kerkhove, The history of Australia's Frontier Wars is becoming a hot topic for debate and research. It is now part of our national educational syllabus. It reveals a deep entanglement of polar expedition with British imperialism, and shows how geographical knowledge intertwined with convict policy, humanitarianism, genocide and authority. In these imperial spaces families such as the Franklins negotiated their tenuous authority over knowledge to engage with the politics of truth and question the

credibility and trustworthiness of those they sought to silence.
