In recent years a number of checklists and rating scales have been developed to assess for the presence of anxiety symptoms. Two of these measures, the Beck Anxiety Inventory and the Burns Anxiety Inventory (25 item), are widely used and well established inventories for measuring anxiety symptoms and severity. They have both been shown to demonstrate good validity and reliability.
