Georges Brassens and Jacques Brel Chris Tinker, 2005-01-01 The 1950s and 1960s were the golden era of French popular song, known as *chanson française*, and Georges Brassens and Jacques Brel epitomized both the music and the era. Their fame was worldwide, with writers and artists such as David Bowie and Gabriel García Márquez citing them as key influences. In *Georges Brassens and Jacques Brel*, Chris Tinker sheds new light on the pair and their work by moving beyond the biographical and linguistic approaches that tend to dominate the study of French song. It is both an essential reference guide to the genre and a useful case history of the adaptation of an ancient form to the demands of the modern mass media.
