This thesis examines self-affirmation by creative encounter and finds that this engagement shows a unitive relationship between one's self and one's world, as is represented by the philosophical notion being-in-the-world. The thesis also examines the characteristics of the creative person which should provide other persons who replicate those tendencies to experience more meaningfully their world. The thesis offers that if one harnesses a creative attitude, he will find himself more engaged, more unified, more whole, more his true self, more human, and more capable of perceiving the meaningful.
