The Last Outlaws Katherine Biber, 2025-07-02 Brilliantly reconstructed from contemporary narratives, *The Last Outlaws* is both a gripping work of historical true crime and a richly revealing examination of our nation at its birth. The Chant of Jimmie Blacksmith meets *Killing for Country*. In the winter of 1900, Wiradjuri man Jimmy Governor and his brother Joe murdered nine people across New South Wales, in a rampage that caused panic in the colony on the cusp of nationhood. Triggered, it seems, by a racist incident, they killed men, women and children, evading a vast manhunt until they were eventually captured. Joe was shot in the open; Jimmy survived to be put on trial. Thus the last man to be outlawed in the colony was hanged in the new nation, meeting his end in Darlinghurst Gaol as the Federation decorations were taken down. The brothers' names still resonate, partly due to Thomas Keneally's novel *The Chant of Jimmie Blacksmith* and Fred Schepisi's subsequent film, but their story has remained distorted and obscure. Undertaken with the co-operation of the Governors' descendants, Katherine Biber's compelling reconstruction of events – from the murders themselves to Jimmy's eventual execution – brings this extraordinary story back to life. In doing so it sheds fresh, vivid light on the country that inspired and reacted to the murders. Not only did many of the lawyers and politicians involved also play key roles in Federation, but the case revealed in microcosm the psychology of the nascent nation: its attitudes to land and race; its anxiety about a wider First Nations insurrection; its obsession with paperwork and the emerging 'sciences' of neuroanatomy and criminology; its nepotism, religiosity, sweeping police powers and sensationalist media. More powerfully than the story of Ned Kelly or the Anzacs, the fate of Jimmy Governor illuminates the origin story of the Australian nation. Populated by a cast of extraordinary characters and compelling detail, *The Last Outlaws* brings the energy of true crime into the telling of history, offering an electric new understanding of both our past and our present.

The Failure of the Voice Referendum and the Future of Australian Democracy Gabrielle Appleby, Megan Davis, 2026-01-13 Australia, and Australians, stood at a crossroads in October 2023. Before them lay a new and more accommodating way to practice democracy, a future in which First Nations people were given a representative voice in political decisions in this country. After months of a referendum campaign, struggling over foundational ideals and questions of national identity, misinformation, disinformation and racism, the proposal was overwhelmingly rejected in every Australian state and nationally. The referendum campaign was Australia's first since the failed attempt at a republic in 1999. The political and media environment in which the referendum campaign would unfold was fundamentally changed. These changes included the growth of social media, growing distrust of major political parties, and the rise of fake news and populist politics. This book brings together a diverse set of perspectives to explore the many and complex political, social and historical factors that

influenced the conduct of the campaign and led to the loss. It includes contributions from lawyers, political scientists, historians, human rights experts, health policy experts, land rights campaigners and Indigenous affairs policy experts. The contributors in this book include First Nations and non-Indigenous authors, often writing collaboratively. The majority of the views offered, based in expertise and experience, are those of First Nations. Their writings place the referendum loss in the context of political failure and attempts at structural reform, and Australia's terrible record at amending the Constitution through referendums. The book traces the legal and political development of the draft constitutional provision, and the influence of legal risk on the campaign. A major focus of the book is the impact of misinformation and disinformation, which was rife during the campaign, and media reporting of it. The role that civil society and corporate Australia played in the campaign is considered. The Voice campaign will be placed in the context of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander politics and previous attempts at representation. The book will also place the call for Voice in the context of its ongoing relevance and imperative in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander affairs, explaining the power of representation, the Voice as an expression of sovereignty, and the need for Voice to pursue other structural reforms such as treaty and to realise the promise of land rights. The book concludes by reflecting on the role that history played in the campaign and the implications of the campaign for the practice of Australian history. The book holds lessons for future constitutional change, Indigenous recognition, structural reform and Australia's democracy. It also looks, with constructive pragmatism, at the future direction of First Nations structural reform in Australia and the practice of democracy.

When we have power over our destiny our children will flourish. They will walk in two worlds and their culture will be a gift to their country. The proposals in respect to an Indigenous voice, truth-telling, and a treaty would perhaps be helpful in the development of Indigenous rights and Indigenous intellectual property. This submission discusses the ways in which the recognition of an Indigenous

In his book, *Finding the Heart of the Nation*, Thomas Mayor has explained that the establishment of an Indigenous Voice will improve policy-making in Australia: The establishment of a First Nations Voice enshrined in the Constitution is the priority reform - indeed it is now an urgent reform - because, unlike other racial or ethnic groups, law and policies are being made by governments specifically about us, without us, and too often to our detriment. A Voice is the first reform because it will start to address this political disempowerment, setting us on the path for the future reforms of Treaty and Truth. There should be an Indigenous Voice to Parliament - not merely an Indigenous voice to Government. Once the model for an Indigenous voice has been settled, there should be a referendum. Enabling legislation for the Indigenous Voice should be passed after a referendum has been held in the next term of Parliament. The membership model for the National Voice must provide for a diverse and inclusive representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. The establishment of an Indigenous Voice should be followed by a Treaty and a truth-telling process. The combination of a voice, treaty, and truth would be ideal - rather than merely the recognition of those concepts in isolation. Thomas Mayor has explained the need for an Indigenous Voice. He reflects: The Voice is the key step forward. Truth-telling alone does not produce solutions. We do. And the truth is justification for the solutions we seek and deserve. To use the truth to get meaningful, lasting treaties, and to affect the legislation and policies that have so fatally failed us, we must have a Collective Voice to the Federal Parliament in Canberra. Our Elders have called for a Voice for generations. We direly need representatives that we choose, who are accountable to us - not the parliament, a corporate sponsor or the media. The time has come for this proposal. We must not take "no" for an answer. The line has been drawn in the red sand at Uluru. There remain many outstanding issues of public policy in respect of Indigenous rights and Indigenous intellectual property.
